



Chart 2: Population living on less than \$1 a day (% of total population)




Poverty rate at \$1 a day



Chart 3: Primary completion rate (% of relevant age group)









Chart 4: Under-five mortality rate (per 1,000 live births)





Chart 6: Papua New Guinea




Chart 7: Average protection remains high for the agricultural sector

(Overall Trade Restrictiveness Index tariff equivalent)**




